## Murcia targets housing shortage with new affordable homes

**MURCIA** is rolling out a bold new plan to make housing more accessible for young people and middle-income families. The region aims to build 25,000 affordable homes over the next five years, focusing on practical solutions that meet today's needs.

The initiative will transform unfinished buildings, empty lots, and historic city centres into modern, affordable homes, while respecting archaeological sites. It also embraces new living concepts like co-living and co-housing, which allow residents to share spaces and resources, ideal for first-time buyers, older adults, and people with disabilities.

### **Easier conversions and faster approvals**

The plan makes it easier to turn office spaces or ground-floor shops into homes and gives developers more flexibility when building affordable housing. Bureaucracy will be cut down, and key approvals fast-tracked, speeding up construction.

### **Affordable prices and community impact**

Prices will be capped at €1,840 per square metre, making projects viable while keeping homes within reach. By simplifying rules and opening up more building opportunities, the plan also aims to encourage young people to stay in or return to their communities, boosting social cohesion across the region.

# Murcia feels the heat as September breaks records

## A Month of Contrasts

September in Murcia had a bit of everything: sun, heat, and even some intense storms, but the warmth stood out above all. The region's average temperature reached 23.4°C, making it the third hottest September of the century so far, according to Spain's national weather agency, Aemet. Only 2022 and 2014 were slightly warmer, confirming what many locals already felt: summer just didn't want to let go.

### Late summer heat

The first half of the month brought those unmistakable late-summer days, with highs well above normal. Alcantarilla hit a sweltering 38.5°C on September 4, while the cooler nights in the hillier areas, such as

16.5°C in Benízar, served as a gentle reminder that autumn was slowly on its way. In coastal towns like San Javier and inland areas such as Murcia and Alcantarilla, residents experienced between 12 and 17 tropical nights, those long, warm evenings perfect for dining outdoors or enjoying a relaxed stroll along the seafront.

### Storms arrive late

Then came the storms. The remnants of Hurricane Gabrielle swept across the region at the end of the month, bringing heavy downpours and a sharp change in the weather. Molina de Segura saw more than 140 litres of rain per square metre, while Calblanque, Lorquí, and parts of Murcia also endured torrential showers. In just two days, the region recorded around two-thirds of its total monthly rainfall, and in some places, hail made an unexpected appearance, leaving parts of Sierra Espuña dusted in white.

## Murcia-Almería high-speed rail gets €6.3 million boost

THE Murcia-Almería high-speed rail line has received another boost, with €6.3 million allocated to move works forward on this vital route. The line, stretching 200 kilometres, forms part of the Mediterranean Corridor, a project seen as key to connecting southeastern Spain more closely with the rest of the country and with Europe.

### The Mediterranean Corridor: More than just a railway

The Mediterranean Corridor is more than just a railway. It is a strategic transport link designed to tie Spain's Mediterranean regions, from Algeciras up to the French border, into a modern, fast, and efficient network. For Murcia, this means shorter travel times to major cities, stronger trade links, and easier access for tourism, one of the region's most important industries.

### Where the investment will go

This latest funding will go towards improvements in both track infrastructure and safety systems. Part of the investment will supply expansion devices to protect the rail from temperature changes, while another part will install a backup energy system to guarantee lighting, ventilation, and fire protection in the underground section near Nonduermas. These may sound like technical steps, but they are crucial for ensuring the long-term safety and reliability of the line.

### Economic impact for Murcia

For the Region of Murcia, the impact will be felt in many ways. Faster passenger connections will make it easier for people to travel for work, study, or leisure, while improved freight links will help local producers, particularly in agriculture, get their goods to national and European markets more efficiently. Given Murcia's position as one of Spain's agricultural powerhouses, this could prove a major economic boost.

### Tourism benefits

Tourism is another sector set to benefit. Almería and Murcia's coastline, already a draw for visitors, will be more accessible than ever before. Quicker and more reliable transport links are expected to encourage more people to explore the region, supporting local businesses and creating jobs.
